Snapshots vs photographs

- The main difference between snapshots and photographs is the time spent thinking about the image sought.
- Usually there is no thought before taking a snapshot
- A photograph requires consideration of
 - What is the subject of the photo?
 - How do I want to show the subject?
 - How am I going to achieve this?
 - Often requires very little time but always requires some time

The subject

- Usually obvious to the photographer but not necessarily to the viewer.
- Often merely being mentally aware of the subject matter is sufficient to make the photographer consider the next step

How do I want to show the subject?

- Is physical location important?
- Is pose important?
- Is angle important?

Composition

- Probably the three most important considerations for achieving the image you wish are lighting, focus and composition.
- We are going to talk a little about some composition tips.

Rule of Thirds

- OK the strong suggestion of thirds
- Often placing the subject off centre provides more interest and allows the subject to be placed in context



Leading Lines (draw them in)

- Leading lines do just that
- Can be solid, broken or implied
- Can be artificial or natural
- Generally left lower toward the subject is most effective



























Parallel lines and patterns

Can give a sense of scale






